FRANKSTON NORTH ROTARY CLUB CHRONICLE OF HISTORY

1973-2017



The following chronicle of the history of the Frankston North Rotary Club has been obtained from various reports the club has published, including the Annual President's Reports. This publication is not intended to be a comprehensive history of the club, I will leave that to others who in time may have the skill to research and collect all the information and data that is required for such an undertaking.

This chronicle highlights the commitment and achievements in five of the Avenues of Service enacted at the Council on Legislation in April 2010: Club, Vocational, Community, International and New Generations. The Council on Legislation 2013 changed the New Generations name back to Youth Services. It also includes The Rotary Foundation. Of course, when listing the achievements under the headings indicated, information has also been taken from Club Service, Fellowship, Membership, Fundraising and Educational Trust reports. In 2007, a new 'Leadership Plan' was introduced into the Frankston North Rotary Club and this is reflected in the reporting of activities from the Rotary year 2007/08. To include all the information presented in the yearly reports of the club's activities would have produced too large a document. From time to time it will be important to add further information, and some may wish to include additional activities to the various Rotary year entries.

An item that has been produced in a fair amount of detail is the club's support for the three District Governors, Peter Newman (1994/95), David Louden (2004/05) and Tony Spring (2012/13), and the running of the District Conferences (refer to Annexes A, B and C). These are important years in the history of the club, and demonstrate the talent and, above all, commitment of the members and their partners to the tasks that were required. These District Conferences are highlights in the District calendar and were probably the best conferences run, judging from the accolades received and the regenerated spirits of Rotarians in the District. Following the first Conference at Albury in 1995, other conferences have emulated the achievements of the Rotarians of Frankston North. This high standard was again achieved at Shepparton in 2005 and at Geelong in 2013. This, I believe, is a tribute to the dedication and talent of the members of the Frankston North Rotary Club.

I can only hope that the information that follows demonstrates the commitment that this club and its members have made to the local and international community, showing Service Above Self by helping others in the hope of lasting goodwill and peace in the interest of the world.

Formation details for the Rotary Club of Frankston North

Date of formation: 14 March 1973 **Charter date:** 7 May 1973

The Rotary Club of Frankston North, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Frankston, was formed on 14 March 1973 at the Sundowner Hotel, Seaford. This meeting was attended by 27 people and chaired by Past District Governor (PDG) John Emerton. Others present included George Allsop, District Governor (DG), Bruce Hall, President of the Rotary Club of Frankston, and Norm Arthur (Past President of the Rotary Club of Frankston), the District Governor's Special Representative.

The meeting unanimously resolved that a new club would be formed, known as the Rotary Club of Frankston North. The first meeting of the Rotary Club of Frankston North's Board of Directors was held on 9 May 1973. The Charter was granted on 7 May 1973, and carried the signatures of Roy D. Hickman, President of Rotary International, Harry A. Stewart, Secretary of Rotary International, and George Allsop, District Governor. The Charter Night was held on 5 June 1973 at the Pier Hotel Frankston and was attended by 480 people. The club was chartered with a membership of 24.

An Outreach YMCA Youth Camp for underprivileged young people was supported. Christmas hams raised \$1414. The Christmas raffle raised \$2150.

Youth Service: The Twin Student Exchange with New Zealand continued with Cindy Calvert and Peta Spring outgoing, and Sharleen Anson and Angela Neale incoming. International exchange student Jillian Waugh returned home from Japan and Niels Bie returned back to Denmark. Elizabeth Corcoran departed for Japan. The annual school debate was supported. Two careers nights were held for Year 12 students suggesting procedures for job interviews. The club presented a Youth Activities Program during Youth Activities month with four other Rotary clubs.

Senior Citizens Day was supported. \$500 was donated to Woorinyan; \$2250 was donated to the Frankston Community Hospital; \$2500 was donated to S John's Ambulance Brigade; \$500 donated to the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund; and \$100 was donated to the Nadrasca Disability Services Springvale.

Youth Service: International exchange student Tammy Hanks arrived from the USA. Career interviews were held with students from Ballam Park Technical School and Karingal High School. Bowel Cancer test kits were supplied. Songbooks were given to the elderly. Medi Alert Alarm systems were donated. An historical plaque project was organised for Frankston precincts. Fundraising activities included \$8900 from an auction, \$4392 from the Christmas stocking, \$1769 from ham sales and \$1700 from the golf day. Negotiations commenced with the Frankston City Council for the introduction of a community raffle run by the club.

Youth Service: The Twin Student Exchange with New Zealand continued with Hayley Louden and Scott Gardner outgoing and Jo Shepperd and Stephen Mack incoming. International exchange student Tammy Hanks returned to the USA. Lisa Womersley departed for Japan and Sofia Mansson arrived from Sweden. Career development nights were held with local schools and TAFE. The annual school debate between Peninsula School and John Paul College was supported. A student from Karingal High School was selected to attend the National Summer Science School. The club continued its support for the Rotaract Club of Frankston.

International Service/The Rotary Foundation: Market day raised \$1004 for The Rotary Foundation. The international project with the Rotary Club of Othello concluded. PP Doug Thompson was recognised as a Paul Harris Fellow.

ROTARY YEAR 1990/91

Vocational Service: Four Pride of Workmanship Awards were presented to ladies from the City of Frankston Meals on Wheels. An industry visit was made to Email. 'What's New In My Business' segments were presented by members. A retirement evening was held with guest speakers from a financial planning consultancy. Four Way Test segments were undertaken.

Community Service: The first Community Raffle raised \$87,222 gross. The club held a working-bee at Woorinyan, a clean up of the Kananook railway station and a 'Trees for Survival' project with local schools. The formation of another Probus Club was assessed. Further songbooks were distributed to the elderly. Fundraising activities included the golf day that raised \$4595, the Christmas stocking \$4312, the hospital barrel \$311 and ham sales \$996.

Youth Service: The Twin Student Exchange with New Zealand was restricted due to a lack of interest from local schools. International exchange student Sofia Mansson returned home to Sweden. Mandy Tunks departed for Germany and Kate Rabey arrived from Zimbabwe. The career development program continued with the Karingal High School. The annual school debate between Peninsula School and John Paul College was supported. The Young Achievers Award was presented to two talent athletes, Dianne Wandoch and Scott Bain, to enable them to attend the International Athletic Exchange in USA (\$500 each). ROTARY YEAR 2001/2002

Boundaries and Membership: Significant changes occurred as a result of the 2001 Council on Legislation. Rotary clubs are now defined by location, thus deleting the provision, reference territorial limits and sharing of territory. A club may be organised in the same locality as any one or more existing clubs. The location of the Rotary Club of Frankston North is in the Municipality of the City of Frankston. Membership is reduced to two types, active and honorary, while retaining the classification principle.

Vocational Service: There was a wide range of interesting guest speakers. More than twenty members of the club gave short talks on trends in their business. Two vocational visits were undertaken, the first to the CFA training facility at Carrum Downs (coinciding with the 11 September 2001 terrorist attack in New York, USA on the World Trade Centre) and the second to a Coffee Roasting Plant in Dandenong.

Community Service: A new chapel at the Frankston Hospital had the club's previously donated stained class window reinstalled. The club also made a donation of an audio system, carpet and a couch for the mortuary. The Community Raffle raised \$112,180 gross (proceeds so far are approximately \$850,000). A concrete pathway was constructed at the George Vowell Centre, for use by the visually impaired. Assistance was given to a single mother, recovering from cancer, so that her car could be repaired to road worthy status and her registration fee paid so she was able to drive her children to school and get around. The Relay for Life raised \$2000 for the Cancer Council. The club again participated in the Frankston Swim in aid of the Frankston Community Support and Information Centre. The club's Rotunda at Ballam Park was painted. \$1000 was donated to the Frankston Branch of St John's Ambulance for the purchase of a defibrillator. Support was given to the Salvation Army Red Shield Appeal, raising \$1000.

Youth Service: International exchange student Ruth Johns returned home from Sweden and Silvia Jua returned back to Brazil. Jessica Jeacle departed for Belgium and Marie Halleux arrived from Belgium. Two students were nominated to attend the National Youth Science Form in January 2002, with one of them selected. The club sponsored five Year 10 students to attend the Siemens Science Experience. Links have been established via email in a School Liaison project. The schools involved so far are Frankston Secondary College and Woodleigh. It is hoped to establish links with Mt Erin, Karingal and Monterey Secondary Colleges plus John Paul College. The Youth Photographic competition was run in conjunction with the Frankston Swim. The Educational Trust account balance stands at \$16,710, with assistance during year provided for sponsorship of Kieran Ault-Connell (\$600) to help his preparations for the 2001 Paralympics.

International Service/The Rotary Foundation: The club hosted a welcoming function for the visiting Group Study Exchange team from District 6040 Missouri. The matching grant project with the Rotary Club of Karachi was finally approved. Market day raised \$790 and the weekly collection by 'green frog' raised \$526 for The Rotary Foundation. The major International Rotary Australia World Community Service Project for the Hango Agricultural College, Tonga, was initiated and led by President Bob Edgar. This project involved the collection of computers, books, tools and other miscellaneous items. Bob Edgar, Ian Gardner and Barry Graham visited Tonga to estimate the cost of works and refurbishment (around \$22,000). The club provided a seeding grant of \$3000 with a further \$934 raised. This was followed by a further visit to Tonga by four members to help unload and supervise the distribution of items sent to the college. Support for this project is now being sought from other clubs in the District. PP Tony Spring and Mrs Vicky Martin, Manager of the Frankston Community Support and Information Centre, were recognised as Paul Harris Fellows.

Vale: PP Peter Abel (1933–2002), President 1990/91, died on 4 June 2002. Peter was a well-respected business professional in Frankston real estate. He was renowned for his keen sense of humour and had served Rotary for some 25 years (1977–2002).

ROTARY YEAR 2002/2003

Club Service: CDs were produced that contained club information on Bulletins, Board Minutes, Correspondence, Club History and templates for the period 1996 to 2003. A club survey was undertaken to try to determine how to make the club more attractive to prospective members. David Cahill was presented with the club's Rotarian of the Year for outstanding work with exchange students and fundraising events. The club received the Best Bulletin Award at the District Conference 2003. The club's bulletin is the first fully electronic bulletin in the district.

Vocational Service: 'What's New in My Business' segments continued with club members providing insight into their professions/occupations. An interesting vocational visit was undertaken to the Telstra Global Operations Centre.

Community Service: The club again participated in the Cancer Council's Relay for Life, raising \$800 to assist in cancer research. A \$200 donation was given to the Gateway Church to assist the needy. Frankston Swim was again a success, with over \$4000 raised for the Frankston Community Support and Information Centre. The Community Raffle raised \$85,000 gross. Donation of a refrigerator and fuel safety cage were made to the Frankston Life Saving Club to assist with future Frankston swims. Work was planned to assist the Orwill Street Community House in the next Rotary year. The club's coffee machine was hired out for community functions. The club joined the Mitre 10 Community Benefits scheme. Four large prints, valued in excess of \$4000, were donated to the club and a decision has yet to be made on action to be taken. A project being undertaken by Barry Graham is a Specialty Craft and Embroidery Show to be run in the next Rotary year.

Youth Service: International Exchange Student Jessica Jeacle returned home from Belgium and Marie Halleux returned home to Belgium. Felicity Gilpin went to Belgium and Essi Lindfors arrived from Finland. For the first time a non-Rotary family was involved in hosting arrangements. The club sponsored 10 students to the Siemens Science Experience. The club also interviewed two students for the 2003 National Youth Science Forum (NYSF), but did not make a recommendation for district selection. A student from Woodleigh School was sponsored for the Earthwatch Institute Student Challenge 2003 to be held at Kangaroo Island, South Australia. The club provided and presented the valedictory awards at the Patterson River Secondary College 2002 annual presentation night.

International Service/The Rotary Foundation: The club hosted the Group Study Exchange team from District 6860 Alabama. Luke Kerr was successfully nominated for the outbound team to Alabama. An interim report was received from the Rotary Club of Karachi Metropolitan on the progress of the Matching Grant program to establish home schools to teach women and girls literacy. The club supported a 'Walk on the Moon' function and talk by Dr Harrison Schmitt about his walk on the moon nearly 30 years ago, raising \$2161 that went towards the \$4000 commitment to The Rotary Foundation account to finalise Polio Plus. Other Rotary Foundation activities included an annual market day raising \$516, a garage sale by Rotarian Bob Edgar raising \$175, plus the 'green frog' at club meetings contributing a further \$430. Donations in Kind saw books and equipment shipped to Tonga. The Rotary Australia World Community Service Tonga Project continued to gain momentum with other districts participating. Charter President Lloyd Worland was awarded a Sapphire Pin to his Paul Harris Fellow.

Vocational Service: A visit was made to HMAS Cerberus with attendance at the Naval Parade Divisions. The Frankston Police Station was also visited and an insight gained into local police work.

Community Service: Working bees were conducted at the Orwill Street Community House and Blairlogie. Support was again given to the 'Relay for Life', the Frankston swim and the Rotary Centenary Project (time capsule) for completion 2005. The club participated in the Annual Golf Day run at Peninsula Golf Club. The Community Raffle successfully raised \$88,000 gross. The club sold hot dogs and coffee at the Frankston Council's Christmas Festival of Light. The Mayor's Picnic, an annual event, saw a good turn out from club members, as did the Kananook Celebrations where the club was again responsible for the barbecue arrangements. Assistance was given to organising an auction for Interplast, held at the Seaford Community Hall. The club also participated with City of Frankston in a consultative process for the master plan redevelopment of the Monterey School site.

The National Youth Science Forum started successfully with candidate Luke Treadwell becoming an Australian candidate in the international science exchange. The Siemens Science Experienc was again successful with 10 students attending. Frankston High School students who were planning to complete a civic project at the Frankston railway station were supported. The project gave students the chance to get hands-on experience in the organisation and coordination of a civic project.

International Service/The Rotary Foundation: The Tonga project at the Hango Agricultural College wound up. An auction raised \$2169 to support Interplast. The 'green frog' raised \$521 for The Rotary Foundation. Con Demopoulos and Bob Edgar were recognised as Paul Harris Fellows. Ian Gardner was awarded a Sapphire Pin to his Paul Harris Fellow.

Vale: Charter President, Lloyd C Worland, MBE, OAM (1921–2004), a Paul Harris Fellow with Sapphire was called to higher service on the 10 June 2004. Lloyd established the club and ensured that the standards he set at the first meeting were maintained. He was held in high esteem within District 9820. His contribution to Rotary and the community of Frankston was significant. He was a councillor with the Shire then later the City of Frankston, holding the position of Shire President 1963/64. A vocational visit was made to the local firm Australian Arrow that is involved in the local and world car components industry. Planning was undertaken for the Pride of Workmanship Awards and dinner. The club supported the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund Indigenous Health Scholarship awarded to Paul Hayward.

Community Service: Support was provided with working bees at Blairlogie and Menzies Farm for youth. The Community Raffle was again successful. Since 1990/91, over \$1.2 m has been given to the local community. Relay for Life was again supported. A coffee stall was operated at the Mayor of Frankston's picnic. \$2215 was donated to the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund for bowl cancer research. The club participated in the Frankston Community Golf Day and proceeds were split between Peninsula Health, Legacy and Frankston charities. A fireside information session was held to provide information to new club members on Rotary programs.

Vocational Service: PP Doug Thompson provided a range of outstanding guest speakers and the club bulletin continued to provide useful Rotary and club information. A vocational visit to a local winery at Baxter was a great success. 'What's New in My Business' again proved to be a popular 3-minute segment. The China Forum planned with the assistance of the Frankston Chamber of Commerce, Frankston Council and Melbourne University was deferred owing to the world financial crisis. Pride of Workmanship Awards were presented to members of the Cardiac Team of the Peninsula Private Hospital.

Community Service: The National Tree Day was supported. A number of members undertook painting, cleaning and gardening at the Portsea Camp. The club also sponsored two students from each of five schools in the Frankston area to attend the Portsea Camp summer school. A Matching Grant project that will enable village communities in Tonga to produce healthy food and provide training in agricultural techniques is to be supported by the Rotary Clubs of Frankston North, Croydon and Phillip Island and San Remo. The proposed budged is \$16,000, built on an initial contribution of \$2000 from the club. The Matching Grant for a literacy project for Sri Lanka in conjunction with the Rotary Club of Polgahawela is in the early stages of development. A Sri Lankan dinner held by the club raised \$3900 to support this project. A \$1000 donation was made to the District to support the Rotarians Against Malaria program. Vocational Service: A Guest Rotarian segment was created: Rotarians selected a Rotary Club in the ANZO region, provided a short report on the club's activities, and propose a toast to that club. A fellowship weekend was held at the Blackwood Special School Camp. A barbecue was held at the Hot Springs Spa on the Mornington Peninsula. The annual bowls night was again held at the Long Island Bowling Club. A sports night was held at the Centenary Park Golf Club. Symposia were held outside of club meetings to discuss current community issues. Club Service: A Club Disaster Fund was established so that the club could respond to humanitarian needs in Australia and overseas. Club activities were listed on the club's website for all to access. Specials thanks to Jeanette Magor for her work managing the birthdays, anniversaries and other welfare matters for the club.

Community Service: Considerable work was done to help schools in the area, particularly with financing activities to enhance student participation. The Ardoch Foundation presented a community certificate to the club for the services it provides to schools. Work at Abbeyfield House again demonstrated the talents of member's vocations in maintenance activities, as did the National Tree Planting Day on the boardwalk on the Frankston foreshore. A major project was the construction of a vegetable garden at Monterey Secondary College for Year 10 students.

Youth Service: International exchange student Marley Angus returned from France. Club grants of \$100 each for literacy programs were awarded to Carrum Downs, Banyan Fields, Aldercourt and Mahogany Rise Primary Schools. A grant of \$500 was given to John Paul College to fund two students to the Model United Nations Assembly. Six students from McClelland Secondary College were each given \$100 for the Siemens Science Experience. Funds of \$2500 each were provided for the Breakfast before School Program at St John's, Aldercourt and Mahogany Rise Primary Schools. A grant of \$420 was given to the Seaford Primary School for a student to attend an education camp in Canberra. Mock interviews were held at McClelland College. The concept of Frankston Future Kids was approved for further development.

Fundraising: The club participated in a number of fundraising activities and projects throughout the year. These included the Annual Peninsula Golf Day, Peninsula Link/Linking Melbourne Authority barbecues, Bunnings sausage sizzles, Entertainment Book sales, Christmas cakes and puddings, Relay for Life, the Medallion Club and the Good Friday coffee cart. The Sri Lanka Matching Grant is a literacy project to establish a new community library at Pothuhera and a refurbished library at Eagalle. After a number of difficulties, including a civil war, the project was successfully signed off in September 2011. Myfanwy Guay, nominated by the club, was selected to be part of the Group Study Exchange team to Wisconsin, USA in 2012. Along with the Rotary Clubs of Frankston, Sunrise and Langwarrin, Frankston North Rotary participated in the hosting of the incoming Group Study Exchange team from Wisconsin. DGE Tim Moore was invited to address the club on The Rotary Foundation during The Rotary Foundation month. The Disaster Aid Fund used seeding money of \$6400 from the administration fees of the Community Raffle, half to assist Disaster Aid Australia for international aid and half for assistance within Australia.

The club funded a community technology project in conjunction with the Rotary Club of Dau Angeles, Philippines, and local organisations in the Frankston community. This involved the distribution of computers to the Philippines and eight organisations in the Frankston area. The Rotary Foundation dinner was again successful. The Centurion program continued. Club Service: Judi McKee was inducted as first female President of the club, supported by Linda Tinney as the first female Secretary. Ron Cook was presented with the Royce Abbey Award, the second awarded by the club: an award for a member who shows great enthusiasm for the work of Rotary. Mark Sammut was presented with Rotarian of the Year for his work in fundraising with Peninsula Link, the establishment of 'Friends of Rotary' and work on the club's Vision process. Work on the club history continued, and the weekly bulletin recorded activities. The club was awarded the best website at the 2012/13 District Conference. PE Don MacDonald, Maureen Gillham and Mark Sammut attended the Rotary Leadership Institute for emerging club leaders. This is a relatively new Rotary initiative.

Vocational Service: Vocational visits were made to the Frankston Community Support Centre and Business Interactive. The club is now a member of the Frankston Business Chamber and club representatives attend meetings. The year saw a successful program of guest speakers and an entertaining Sergeant at Arms. Project 300, Friends of Rotary, was created with the idea of fostering closer ties with people who share Rotary's ideal, but, for whatever reason, are unable to commit to full membership of the club.

Community Service: A new computer project distributed reformatted computers to nine not-for-profit organisations in the Frankston area. It is hoped that this project will continue as more computers become available. Work also began on the restoration and painting of the Rotunda at Ballam Park erected by the club 35 years ago. In conjunction with the Frankston City Council and the Department of Justice, the club undertook the Adopt a Park Project initially to remove graffiti and paint the bollard at Ballam Park. VCAL students from McClelland Secondary College joined this project as part of their community service.

Youth Service: Using funds from the Educational Trust, the club sponsored three students to the Siemens Science Experience. The club matched a \$2000 District Simplified Grant from The Rotary Foundation to complete a literacy program at the Seaford North, Seaford, Frankston Heights and Ballam Park Primary Schools. The club funded delegates to go to the Rotary Youth Leadership Award weekend camp. The Rotary Youth Leadership Award provides professional guidance in leadership, team building, public speaking and personal confidence. The Rotary Junior Community Award, based on the Duke of Edinburgh's Award, is a program designed for young people regardless of mental or physical abilities. Activities include community service, physical activities, skills and social experience. Aldercourt and Mahogany Rise Primary Schools had four and eight students respectively involved. Mock interviews, designed to assist students in preparation for the workforce, were again held at McClelland Secondary College.

Fundraising: The club continued links with the Linking Melbourne Authority, Frankston City Council and Abigroup. Besides fundraising, these links gave the club the opportunity to engage with the community and to increase the club's public image. More than 55 Rotarians, partners, families and friends of the club participated in a Peninsula Link Community Day. Fundraising activities included the Annual Peninsula Golf Day, six Peninsula Link/Linking Melbourne Authority barbecues, four Frankston City Council barbecues, one Frankston City Council Social Club barbecue, one Passion for Pets barbecue, and Entertainment Book sales. International Service/The Rotary Foundation: The Popua Garden Project, Tonga, was a result of the club's long association with the Tongan community, particularly the successful restoration of the farm machinery training building at the Hango Agricultural College on the outer island of Eua. A matching grant from The Rotary Foundation was obtained with the support of the Rotary Clubs of Croydon, Phillip Island and San Remo and Nuku'alofa to provide 20 poultry sheds and 20 domestic gardens for village residents. A proposal for a future Rotary Australia World Community Service project has been submitted in cooperation with the Rotary Club of Croydon. Funding was provided to help cover the costs of a Peninsula Rotaract volunteer trip to Timor Leste. Gabriella Condello spoke at the District Conference 2013 in Geelong on what this visit achieved. Bill Fowler went to Fiji as a representative on Rotary's Fijian Rota Homes Project: building homes for the disadvantaged. The club donated goods through Donations in Kind to a Care Somaliland Project and a container of goods went to Kenya. Continued support was given to the Centurion Program. The Group Study Exchange team from Wisconsin visited the club in November. The District Foundation Seminar was attended by four members to support PP Bob Edgar in his presentation on applying for Matching Grants. The Rotary Foundation New Vision, which will apply from 1 July 2013, was presented to the club. PP David Hanlon and PP Geoff Magor were recognised as Paul Harris Fellows for their outstanding work in support of Rotary and the community.

Club Themes for the Year: Wellness, Governance, and 'Club' to 'Community'

Frankston North Rotary can be proud of its achievement this Rotary Year in meeting the global theme of Engage Rotary Change Lives. Added to this, the club themes of 'Wellness', 'Governance' and 'Club to Community', we can be proud that we raised substantial funds through our local fundraising activities, and substantially through our global initiatives for the Rotary Foundation. We completed two Global Grants, a first for District 9820. We embarked upon an ambitious membership strategy and inducted two new members, both female, boosting the wonderful contribution already made by our female members. We spent substantial effort on implementing a branding strategy that saw the naming of our club 'Frankston North Rotary', widening the appeal we had within the communities we served. We inducted four Paul Harris Fellows, two from our extended community and two from within Frankston North Rotary. At the District Conference Frankston North Rotary was recognised for having the 'Best Bulletin', 'Best Web Page' and the Australian Rotary Health for fundraising.

Club Service: This year's Rotary theme 'Engage Rotary and Change Lives' was reflected very strongly through our Avenues of Service. The rebranding of the Rotary Club to Frankston North Rotary (FNR), included producing a brochure that illustrated the extensive work of the club in the communities we serve, new banners and business cards. The website was relaunched, our letterhead was adjusted, and associated polo shirts and caps reflecting the branding were initiated. We updated our Bye Laws and improved our stewardship by rationalising our financial accounts.

Membership and Club Development: Two new members were inducted. Our club's first Community Engagement night for membership was held on 27 November at the premises of Arrow/Yuzaki. This was well attended and began a move toward the development of corporate membership.

Vocational Service: The CFA and Mica organisations were given 'Excellence in Workmanship' awards, and the evening was very entertaining. A visit to the JAYCO caravan manufacturers was well attended, and good fellowship enjoyed by all. A visit to the Walter and Elisa Hall research establishment in Parkville was enjoyed by 12 members who learnt a great deal about research on Malaria.

Community Service: Once again the club ran the Community Raffle to raise funds for local organisations. Balance as at 31 May 2014 was \$62,869.34.

Community Activities: Bollards were painted and graffiti removed from Ballam Park, and we engaged students from McClelland Secondary College to participate in the tasks. We contributed to the Breakfast Programs at Monterey Secondary College, Aldercourt Primary School and Mahogany Rise Primary School. PDG Peter Newman and PP Brian Capon continue in the role of Trustees of the Community Support Frankston Material Aid trust. PP Geoff Magor is acting Treasurer at Frankston Community Support. PP John Tame and PP Geoff Magor were on the organising Committee for the Frankston North Festival that was attended by in excess of 4000 people. The club ran a sausage sizzle on the day to raise funds for the refurbishment of the Frankston North Community Gardens. The club organised and ran a stall at the neighbourhood day for the Frankston Council. The Frankston North Rotary website won the best web site award at the 2014 District Conference, reinforcing the quality of our work. Thanks to all those involved, especially Vicki Strickland our Web Page developer. The Computers for Communities Program saw the transfer of computers to several local organisations. This activity drew down upon the members of the club to prepare the computers for shipping.

Youth Service: Junior Community Award: 13 students from Aldercourt Primary School and Mahogany Rise Primary School complete the course and all were presented with their certificates in the Frankston Council Chamber by the Mayor of Frankston.

International Service: Rotarian Bill Fowler was involved in the Rota Homes project in Fiji, building homes for the disadvantaged.

The Rotary Foundation: The Tonga Global Grant for AUD\$53k (NZ \$200k) was granted to provide 300 Household Vegetable Gardens/Hen Houses. 16 Clubs were involved in raising an initial \$19,000 involved, including Frankston North. Raised \$19,000 \$50,000 GG approved November 2013 \$200,000 provided by Department of Foreign Affairs Tonga in New Zealand via Rotary New Zealand World Community. Global Grant: India – US\$30k passed from Rotary International to Rotary Club Salem-Mid Town, Tamil Nadu for eye treatment, FNR served as the international club. On 29 March PDG David Louden opened his home for a very successful fundraising/fellowship day. About \$850 was raised for The Rotary Foundation. This year four individuals were recognised as a Paul Harris Fellow, two external to the Frankston North Rotary: Mr Paul Surridge who was recognised for his work within the Australian Defence Service (at the Naval Club Langwarrin during the ANZAC evening remembrance) and Mrs Carla Spring. Current Rotarians Bob Edgar, now with the Rotary Club of Bendigo received a sapphire Pin, and PP Charles Mallia. Mrs Carla Spring was named a Paul Harris Fellow on 2 April for support to Rotary and a project in India.

Rotary Learning: As part of our membership development, 'Wellness', we ran a program headed 'Person in Rotary' with a focus on Accountability, Learning, Rules and Regulations, and Fellowship. The presentations were delivered by long-standing Rotarians, and the members were given a feast of knowledge to help balance their understanding of Rotary International.

Club Service: The primary goal was to highlight the club as a well-known and respected service club throughout the community, with improved publicity at Frankston North Rotary activities and functions. The club has an envious record in electronic communications and was again recognised at the District Conference as having the best website in the District. The improved *Rotary Ho* was now produced in PDF format and posted on the website and emailed to readers. Ron Cook was named Club Rotarian of the Year for his tireless community work. Mrs Mal Hackett was presented with a Certificate of Appreciated for her work making teddy bears for ill children at the Frankston Hospital. PDG Peter Newman (PP, PHF and Sapphire, Service above Self Award, Efficiency Decoration (Military) was awarded an Order of Australia Medal 2015 for service to veterans and the community.

Vocational Service: The Rotary Club of Cranbourne joined one of the club meetings. The Nepean cluster of clubs joined with the Frankston North Rotary in a commemorative meeting to recognise 100 years of ANZAC. Fellowship continued to play a large part of the club's activities with Christmas in July, a mystery bus tour to Arthurs Seat, a Christmas dinner at Baxter Valley Winery Estate and participation in a Bowls Night at the Seaford Bowling Club. A number of club members attended the District Conference in Shepparton and PDG Peter Newman and PP Eric Neill presented the ANZAC Commemoration segment of the Conference. The wide range of guest speakers included the Moss Foundation (bring water to villages in Swaziland), the Principle of Monterey Secondary College and the CEO of the Cranbourne Racing Club. PP Glen Ellam gave a talk on the taxi industry. A visit was organised to the Bar Crusher Boats in Dandenong.

Community Service: Projects included The Pine Patch Community Garden and Computers for Communities with over 100 computers donated via PP Eric Neill to community groups and schools in the Frankston area. A District grant was received to purchase monitors in support of this computer program.

Youth Service: Past Exchange Student Emma Malmstrom visited from Sweden. Invitations were sent to various schools to participate in the Model United Nations Assembly, the Rotary Youth Leadership Award and NSYF, but unfortunately there was no interest. Mock interviews were held at McClelland Secondary College. The Breakfast Before Schools Program continued with a donation by the Rotary Club of Salem Midtown India and \$2000 from the club. The Rotary Junior Award Program was again a great success with 26 children from the Mahogany Rise and Aldercourt Primary Schools participating. The Mayor of Frankston presented the certificates and badges to the students.

Educational Trust: The Education Trust gave \$1000 to the Rowellan Primary School so that 100 underprivileged students could participate in a Literacy and Numeracy Program. Aldercourt Primary School was given \$480 to support a student from a disadvantaged large family. Monterey Secondary College was allocated \$400 to purchase a tablet so that a student could participate in the school's programs.

Fundraising: The Community Raffle continued to be the major club activity, selling 34,775 tickets and raising \$56,212 for 75 participating community organisations. Around 350 people attended the club's new venture, the International Women's Day Breakfast, supported by the Rotary clubs of Frankston, Mt Eliza and Peninsula 2.0. It was a great success due to the initiative of Judi McKee, and raised sufficient funds to provide Back Pack Beds for homeless women in Frankston. Other activities included barbecues at the new Peninsula Aquatic Recreation Centre, at Bunnings during the Melbourne Cup weekend and to support the Frankston Council. The club was again involved in the Annual Peninsula Golf Day. A successful second Annual Garden party was held to assist with the sponsoring of the Peninsula Youth Music Society.

International Service/The Rotary Foundation: A number of International activities were carried out. PP Eric Neill led the Group Study Exchange to Turkey in 2015, the ANZAC 100th Anniversary Commemoration year. Global Grants continued, providing household vegetable gardens and domestic chicken houses in Tonga, and providing eye-testing equipment to India. District Grants included \$1472 for 85 computers that were given to needy community organisations and \$1500 for to support the Voices of Frankston Choir that comprises disadvantaged people. An application was made for \$2000 for an access path and ramp at the Pines Community Gardens. The club met its foundation target by provided funds to The Rotary Foundation by giving US\$2000 to the Programs Fund and US\$1000 to Polio Plus. Another successful project was funds raised at a joint event between the club and the Inner Wheel Club of Nepean, held at Clover Cottage Berwick, went to The Rotary Foundation's 'End Polio Project'. PP Judy McKee recognised as a Paul Harris Fellow for her services to Rotary.

Club Service: Club workshops discussed projects and fundraising with the idea of planning actions for the year ahead. Membership focus was on developing new strategies that included a 'Corporate Brochure' to attract businesses to the club. Rotarian Rhonda Idczak was presented with Rotarian of the Year for her outstanding effort throughout the Rotary year. PDG Tim Moore exploring various membership strategies at District and Rotary International level. The website and Facebook continued to play a role in advertising the club's activities. A number of articles were published in school and community newsletters and magazines. An article on the Computers in Schools Program was published in a local newspaper.

Vocational Service: A number of interesting speakers attended during the year. Theses included PP Maureen Gillham's sister, Kathy Nelson, on Indigenous Health in Western Australia; Janet Reid on the operation of the Frankston North Community Centre; Jan de Koning, the Principle of St Augustine Primary School, on the role of technology in teaching; Andrew McKee, a police officer, on the role of a UN Peace Keeper in Timor Leste; Kirsty Sullivan, ICU Manager, Frankston Hospital, on 'No Roads to Health' in PNG; Fiona Sturman on sailing on The Spirit of Tasmania; Marg Perry on the Operation Christmas Child with the Samaritans Purse. Dr Hayley Maginness from the Mt Eliza Chiropractic Clinic on spinal health; Doug Stewart, South East Water, on the range of assets looked after; Ray Scott, author, on the process of getting books published; and Stuart Jones, Principle of Monterey Secondary College, on trends in education and the jobs schools need to educate students for into the future.

Community Service: Through the Computers for Communities program, started 5 years ago, computers were issued to Monterey Secondary College, Karingal Heights Primary School, St John's Primary School, St Augustine Primary School, the Vietnam Veteran Centres at the Noble Park RSL and the Oakleigh RSL Welfare Group. Painting bollards and graffiti removal continued for the Adopt a Park Project at Ballam Park. Working bees were held at Abbeyfield House, replacing retaining wall sleepers in garden areas, and also at Monterey Secondary College, painting the main entrance and lines in the car park, and gardening. Vision Australia donated over 100 teddy bears to Peninsula Health for sick children in the Frankston Hospital.

Youth Service: International exchange student Carolina (Carol) Tapioka arrived from Brazil. Carol was a credit to her country and a pleasure to host. Keehlan Ferrari-Brown, sponsored by the club and Frankston Peninsula 2.0, departed for the USA. An Interact Club was chartered at the Monterey Secondary College, named Monteract. District Governor, Merv Williams, and District Governor Elect, Lynne Westland, parents, students, Peninsula Rotaract and members of the club attended the evening. Eight students from Mahogany Primary School were presented with their course books and pins for the Junior Community Awards. The Breakfast before Schools Program was not supported.

A successful second Annual Garden party was held to assist with the sponsoring of the Peninsula Youth Music Society. Over \$2000 was raised, going towards buying instruments for budding musicians who could not afford to purchase their own instruments. Two members of the club attended Woodleigh Senior School to conduct mock interviews and members also participate on the Year 10 Pathway mock interviews.

Fundraising: The Community Raffle, one of the club's cornerstone fundraising activities, was again a success. The Annual Golf Day was cancelled due to refurbishment activities at the Peninsula Golf Club. The second International Woman's Day Breakfast was held at the Mornington Race Course and attracted 370 attendees. This is a collaborative effort with the Frankston, Peninsula 2.0 and Mt Eliza Rotary Clubs. The theme was *Women of Change* and guest speakers were Kristy Kendall, Principle Toorak College, and Moira Kelly, AO, Australian humanitarian. \$4200 was raised, of which \$2800 was donated to the Moira Kelly Foundation to support her humanitarian work. The club run a number of successful barbecues and a trivia night.

Educational Trust: There was only one call for assistance from the Trust. This was to help a student whose family could not afford to replace her iPad, critical to her studies, at a cost of \$368. The Trust Committee is to review ways to be more proactive in advising the community, particularly primary, secondary and tertiary institutions, of the criteria of the Trust.

International Service/The Rotary Foundation: The club made a donation to help establish the Rotary Club of Lafaek Dilli. Along with the Rotary New Zealand World Community Service and the New Zealand Government, the Global Grant in Tonga project has been able to help about 300 households spread over three villages become self-sufficient in vegetable supply and poultry. The project, run over 2 years, has now been finalised. Along with personal giving, the club again supported The Rotary Foundation giving US\$4083 to the Annual Fund and US\$1310 to Polio Plus. The club supported a film night at the Mornington Cinema raising \$1128 for Polio Plus. The club sold calendars for \$540 to raise funds for Polio Plus. Donations in Kind again played an important role in the club's activities due to PP Judy McKee's influence with Peninsula Health, giving the club a strategic advantage to obtain surplus equipment and replacements. The club applied for a District Grant for \$2000 for 2016/17 to provide Year 7 playground equipment at Monterey Secondary College. Mr Robert Bolch, JP, was recognised as a Paul Harris Fellow for services to Victoria Police and the community for establishing the Frankston Document Signing Station. Bill Fowler recognised as a Paul Harris Fellow for his service to Rotary.

Vale: Past President of the club, Trevor LaBrooy, passed away on 16 June 2016 after a long illness. Trevor was President in 1983/84. He was a well-known doctor serving the Frankston community for many years and was the family doctor to a number of club members.

Club Service: Five new members were welcomed to the club during the year, including the first corporate member, Arthur Proios, from Eview. Also, with the support of the Frankston City Council, Janet Reid, the Frankston North Community Centre Coordinator, was able to join the club. One member left after many years of dedicated commitment. Rotarian Tony Crawford was presented with Rotarian of the Year for his outstanding effort throughout the Rotary year especially with the EMC Deb Balls. The website and Facebook continued to play a role in advertising the club's activities, and the *Rotary Ho*, website and Facebook page received the D9820 Media award at the District Conference. There was a major change to the branding of Frankston North Rotary with matching polo shirts, jackets and caps. The new polo shirt design, along with a new photograph of the Frankston Pier, were used to create a new image for letterheads, roll-up banners, the website and Facebook headings, magnetic signs for the trailer, business cards, a publicity brochure and a new Certificates of Appreciation. Thanks to Rhonda Idczak for her wonderful work in this development.

The 3200 magazine for Frankston North published articles on the installation of the Monterey Secondary College Year 7 playground equipment and the presentation of the Junior Community Awards, plus an article about Frankston North Rotary. An article promoting the Community Raffle was published in the *Frankston News* and an article on the installation of the Monterey Secondary College Year 7 Playground Equipment was published in the *Frankston Leader*. Work on the club's history continued throughout the year, and this history will be posted soon. Also the acknowledgements for birthdays and anniversaries were changed to electronic cards: this has been well accepted.

Vocational Service: Several fellowship events were enjoyed by all, in particular Michael and Jenny Hall's mock wedding. A bowling team was entered in the Mt Eliza Bowling Clubs Community Teams event. Although finishing 6th overall, lots of fun and enjoyed by all. Arthur Proios from Eview Real Estate hosted members at his premises where he and two of his agents spoke about the real estate industry in general and the Frankston market in particular. The night raised \$360. A successful night on Mental Health Hat Day raised \$160. Community Service: Work continued at Abbeyfield House to ensure that disadvantaged elderly people have a safe place to live. Club members cleaned up the garden for a widow in Frankston South who is battling health issues. Frankston North Rotary members worked over 4 days to refurbish the floor of the Frankston South Guide Hall: quite a backbreaking task. Through the Computers for Communities program, laptops and other computers have been supplied to schools in Frankston North including laser printers to Monterey Secondary College.

Youth Service: A District Grant helped provide playground equipment for Year 7 students at Monterey Secondary College, a joint project with Frankston North Rotary, Monterey Secondary College and the Monteract Club. The Junior Community awards were run again, and 25 students from Aldercourt Primary School were presented with certificates and badges. Two students from Monterey Secondary College represented Argentina in the Model United Nations Assembly. Two members of the Frankston North Rotary Club attended Woodleigh Senior School to conduct mock interviews. The Monteract Club has grown throughout the year with around 15 plus members. This year a mutual exchange of Interact students occurred between Monterey Secondary College and Adhyapan School, Madurai, Tamil Nadu, India. Frankston North Rotary supported the event by hosting the welcome of the Indian delegation and providing a meal. The other youth project was the two wonderful Debutante balls organised for Elisabeth Murdoch College students. There were around 700 attendees over 2 nights and 52 debutant couples were presented. The balls were such an outstanding success raising \$5266.

Fundraising: The International Women's Day Breakfast was again a wonderful success with inspirational speakers and over 400 attendees. The project is a collaborative effort by Frankston North Rotary and the Frankston, Peninsula 2.0 and Mount Eliza Rotary clubs. The money raised was donated the Caroline Chisholm Institute to assist a worthy student experiencing financial hardship to receive a high quality, vocational educational qualification. This year 65 clubs and groups participated in the Community Raffle, slightly down on last year as were the ticket sales. Two wonderful Debutante balls were organised for Elisabeth Murdoch College students. The balls were such an outstanding success that they should be run again next year. Two Bunnings BBQs raised \$2380. The Mayors Picnic raised \$204, the Christmas Party raised \$300 and the Party in the Park raised \$1000.

Educational Trust: The club's Educational Trust fund donated a graphics calculator to one of Community Support Frankston client's family for their daughter as the family was doing things hard and a laptop for a student whose family could not afford one. The current financial situation of the Trust is \$20,000 held in Term Deposit and \$1073 in the cheque account.

International Service/The Rotary Foundation: This year was The Rotary Foundation 100 year's celebration. Frankston North Rotary was the best supporting club at a special District Diner Dance and were heavily involved in a successful Cluster Celebration that was run at Frankston Bombers Football Ground. Frankston North Rotary, along with personal giving, again supported The Rotary Foundation, giving US\$5722 to the Annual Fund and US\$1074 to Polio Plus. The *Guess Who's Coming to Dinner* fellowship night raised \$570 for International Rotary. A project was also supported to fund a female toilet block for students at a local school in Tamil Nadu. The Donations In Kind program continued with Peninsula Health, thanks to the support of PP Judi McKee, with hospital equipment donated by Peninsula Health bound for destinations in Timor Leste and Toga.

Mary Bawden was recognised as a Paul Harris Fellow for her services to the community. Eric Neill received a Sapphire Pin to his Paul Harris Fellow. Peter Newman and David Cahill received a second Sapphire Pin to their Paul Harris Fellow. Janet Cahill was recognised as a Paul Harris Fellow by the District for her support to David in his role as District Secretary.

Club Service: Two new members, Simon Gillam and Alan Harwood, were welcomed to the club during the year, but we unfortunately we lost some members due to changes in their life priorities. Rotarians Maree Hutchins and Rhonda Idczak were presented with Rotarian of the Year award for their outstanding effort throughout the Rotary year especially with the Elisabeth Murdoch Debutant Balls. The website and Facebook continued to play a role in advertising the club's activities, and the club bulletin, *Rotary Ho*, continued to keep all members informed. The major changes to the branding of Frankston North Rotary in 2016/17 were followed on with an updated tri-fold brochure. We have now built a strong and successful identity for the club. Work on the club's history continued throughout the year and this history, from 1973 to 2018, is now posted on the website.

Vocational Service: Several fellowship events were enjoyed by all, including a grand final night held at the Bombers ground, with Robert Mace as speaker, and a Melbourne Cup night at the Hall's with a re-enactment of the mock wedding of Michael and Jenny. The club Christmas function was another excellent night with a visit by Kate Shanks from the Frankston North Salvation Army who received gifts and a cheque for underprivileged children. Con and Loula Demopoulos hosted an excellent night of Greek fare at their home. A group of 27 members, partners and friends travelled to Queenscliff for a weekend to board the Blues train: what a fantastic experience. An interesting vocational visit was made to the Greek Orthodox Church in Frankston. Two bowling team were entered in the Mt Eliza Bowling Clubs Community Teams event and a lot of fun was had by all. The year saw a successful program of guest speakers on a variety of topics including men's health, depression, youth education, drug addiction and environmental and community matters, and some of our members also gave their autobiographies. The club recognised ANZAC Day with a speaker and PDG Peter Newman delivered the ANZAC address.

Community Service: Work continued at Abbeyfield House to ensure that disadvantaged elderly people have a safe place to live. The club was successful in gaining a \$2000 grant for work on room refurbishment. Graffiti removal was undertaken as part of the Adopt a Park program at Ballam Park. Club members completed a general cleanup of a garden and removed rubbish for a single mother battling health issues. The club also carried out two working bees to bring a garden back to a state where a resident could manage it himself despite his disabilities. Members also held a working bee to clean up the mini farm site at Monterey Secondary College. The Computers for Communities program was relatively quiet, with two laptop computers supplied to Monterey Secondary College. The school is moving toward laptop classes and the club is looking toward supporting this program in 2018/19. Dress for Success Mornington Peninsula, a not-for-profit organisation that focuses on preparing individuals to re-enter the workforce, has received advice and help with their computers. Once again the club ran the Community Raffle to raise funds for local organisations.

Youth Service: Two students from Monterey Secondary College represented Australia in the Model United Nations Assembly. The Monteract Club grew throughout the year with around 50 plus members, as the school decided that all year level captains should be part of Monteract for their personal development. There were no Junior Community Awards made this year, and the club was not involved with the National Youth Science Forum or the Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment. The club again supported the Rotary Youth Leadership Award selecting a local community worker to attend. The club was again involved with Monterey Secondary College Indian exchange, attending a cultural presentation and meal put on by the students of the Adhyapan School, Madurai, Tamil Nadu, India.

Fundraising: The International Women's Day Breakfast was again a wonderful success with inspirational speakers and over 300 attendees. The project is a collaborative effort by Frankston North Rotary and the Frankston, Peninsula 2.0 and Mount Eliza Rotary clubs. The \$3500 raised was donated the WAYSS to assist those who are homeless or victims of domestic violence. This year 54 clubs and groups participated in the Community Raffle, slightly down on last year. Three Bunnings BBQs raised \$2942. The Mayors Picnic raised \$648 and the Party in the Park car parking fees raised \$1000.

Educational Trust: The current financial situation of the Trust is \$22,000 held in Term Deposit and \$1,073 in the cheque account. There were no donations made from the Trust during the 2017/18 year. A Peter Newman Frankston North Rotary Award was set up to give a \$500 award to a worthy student each year. The first award will be made in the second half of 2018.

International Service/The Rotary Foundation: Frankston North Rotary again participated in many areas of The Rotary Foundation, giving \$4160 to the Annual Fund, \$1300 to Polio Plus and \$1700 in personal Centurion Club contributions. The club was well represented at the Foundation seminar in November. The *Guess Who's Coming to Dinner* fellowship night raised \$525 for International Rotary. A project was also supported by contributing \$2000 to fund a female toilet block for students at a local school in Tamil Nadu; work should be finalised soon. The Donations In Kind program continued with Peninsula Health, thanks to the support of PP Judi McKee. We joined with other cluster clubs to sponsor Donations in Kind for 2 years, also sponsoring racking in the store at a cost of \$450. Frankston North Rotary enjoys a long-standing relationship with international partners in India, and the club hosted a one day Rotary Friendship Exchange from District 2981 in Tamilnadu, India. Don MacDonald was recognised as a Paul Harris Fellow. David Hanlon and Geoff Major received a second Sapphire Pin to their Paul Harris Fellow.
