Article I The name of this organization shall be Rotary Club of FRANKSTON NORTH

Article II The territorial limits of this club are as follows: All that territory bounded on the WEST by Port Phillip Bay and on the SOUTH from Port Phillip Bay along Wells St. Nepean Highway, Ross-Smith Avenue, Young Street, Beach Street, Cranbourne Road to the City of Frankston boundary at Boundary Road and on the EAST by the City of Frankston Boundary along Boundary Road from Cranbourne Road to Ske Road and then on the NORTH by Skye Road, Overton Road, Bo Bentons Avenue and then through the Mile Bridge to Port Phillip Bay.

FOR OUTSIDE U.S.A. AND CANADA ONLY

Article X ~~is~~ ^{is not} retained in the club constitution making subscription to the English edition of "The Rotarian" magazine an obligation of membership in the club. If not retained, subscriptions are voluntary.

BY LAWS

Article I, Section 1—Election of Directors and Officers

(Insert in the spaces provided hereunder information regarding the plan adopted by the club for election of directors and officers, crossing out the plan not adopted. NOTE: If the alternative plan is adopted it provides for the immediate past president to be a member of the board of directors. Since there will be no immediate past president at the time of organization, the club may, if it desires, elect an extra director for the first year.)

Article I

Section 1—At a regular meeting one month prior to the meeting for election of officers nominations shall be called for by the presiding officer for candidates for the board of directors; any number of nominations may be made by the members from the floor. These nominations shall be placed upon a ballot and voted for at the annual meeting and the candidates securing the highest number of votes shall be declared elected.

Article II (Same plan to be adopted as in Article I.)

Article I—Alternative Plan

Section 1—At a regular meeting one month prior to the meeting for election of officers, the presiding officer shall ask for nominations by members of the club for president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer and members of the board of directors. The nominations may be presented by a nominating committee or by members from the floor, by either or by both, as the club may determine. If it is determined to have a nominating committee, such committee shall be appointed as the club may determine. The nominations duly made shall be placed on a ballot in alphabetical order under each office and shall be voted for at the annual meeting. The candidates for president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer receiving a majority of the votes shall be declared elected to their respective offices. The candidates for director receiving a majority of the votes shall be declared elected as directors.

UNDERSTANDINGS AND AGREEMENTS

Subscribed to by this
Club in the presentation of this application to R.I.

1. As our constitution, we have adopted the standard club constitution prescribed by Rotary International. This club understands that the club constitution can be amended only by convention of Rotary International, or (under certain circumstances for exceptional reasons) by the board of directors of Rotary International, in accordance with Section 2(d), Article I, of the bylaws of R.I. No amendment to the bylaws adopted by this club which might conflict with the constitution of the club or with the constitution and bylaws of Rotary International will be made without first submitting such proposed amendment to the general secretary of Rotary International for approval by its board of directors.
2. This club will be bound by any and all amendments to the standard club constitution which may be adopted hereafter (as provided in Article I, Section 2(b), of the bylaws of Rotary International, and in Article XIV of the constitution of this club).
3. This club will remit payment for its members' subscriptions to THE ROTARIAN as provided for in the club bylaws upon receipt of invoice covering such subscriptions. (An obligation of membership in the United States and Canada; elsewhere only when Article X is retained in club constitution.)
4. NO FURTHER MEMBERS will be elected between the filing of this application and the receipt of the official notice of the admission of the club to membership in Rotary International.
5. This club, as a club, will not become a member of, or assume obligations of membership in any organization other than Rotary International.
6. This club is hereby pledged, in its desire to develop true Rotarians and a Rotary club that will function properly as a unit in Rotary International, to maintain the following fundamental characteristics of Rotary:
 - a. Rotary is concerned with the development, encouragement, and fostering of understanding, good will, and peaceful relations among people throughout the world based upon the ideal of service.
 - b. Rotary is a world fellowship of business and professional men banded together in Rotary clubs for the purpose of encouraging the practical application of the ideal of service both individually and collectively—with emphasis on the individual.
 - c. A Rotary club selects its members on a basis of classification in accordance with the nature and place of the individual's business or professional activities.
 - d. Attendance at regular club meetings is required at least to a stated minimum for the continuance of membership so that acquaintance and fellowship may be developed as a first step toward lasting friendships.
 - e. Rotary clubs provide members with opportunities to develop an appreciation of and a desire to practice and exemplify high ethical standards in their personal and business or professional activities.
 - f. The religious and political beliefs of a Rotarian are regarded as being his own concern. A Rotarian is expected to be faithful to his religion and loyal in his citizenship.

ROTARY CLUB OF FRANKSTON NORTH

1973-1978

New Rotary Clubs are formed on the initiative of existing clubs and the need generally arises out of the growth of membership in an existing club or growth of population in its area.

The population of the City of Frankston increased rapidly in the late 1960s and early 1970s and this was reflected in the growing number of members in the Rotary Club of Frankston whose club boundaries covered the whole of Frankston and some adjacent areas.

In 1972 the Rotary Club of Frankston recognised that the time had come for it to sponsor the creation of a new club and to cede to it part of its club area.

The Inaugural Meeting of the new club was held on 14 March 1973 at the Sundowner Hotel, Seaford. It was attended by 27 people and chaired by Past District Governor John Emerton. Others present were District Governor George Allsop, Bruce Hall (President of the sponsoring club, Frankston), the District Governor's special representative Norm Arthur (Past Resident of the Frankston Club) and a number of interested Rotarians from the Frankston Club.

The meeting unanimously resolved that a new club should be formed and that it should be known as the Rotary Club of Frankston North.

In accordance with Rotary International requirements, territorial limits were set and these limits, as described in the "Intention To Cede" papers proposed by the Rotary Club of Frankston, were accepted by the new club.

The election of office bearers then took place and the following officers were appointed:

<u>Charter President:</u>	Lloyd Worland
<u>Charter Vice-President:</u>	Bob Dawson
<u>Charter Secretary:</u>	Lloyd Beard
<u>Charter Treasurer:</u>	Max Batey.

The election of directors was deferred for a few weeks to give members time to get to know one another before making these decisions.

It was decided that the weekly club meetings would be held on Wednesday evenings at 6.30 p.m., that joining fees would be \$15.00 and membership dues \$20.00 per annum.

It is perhaps of interest to note that the minutes of this meeting record that the meeting finished at 10 p.m. and in fitting manner continued "with excellent fellowship carrying on for some time after that".

PROGRESSING TOWARDS A CHARTER:

The first meeting of the club Board of Directors was held on 9th May, 1973. There is no record of the elections for the Board, but the original directors, apart from the club officers, were Les Hunter (Community Service), Syd Jones (Vocational Service) and Chris Dev (International Service).

The search for and selection of new members then began.

The design of the club banner and the layout of the club bulletin were discussed and stationery was ordered. The club administration had begun to function and the business of operating a Rotary Club was well in hand.

THE CHARTER PRESENTATION:

The charter presentation dinner was held in the Neptune Room of the Pier (now Sovereign) Hotel on Tuesday, 5th June 1973. A list of charter members appears elsewhere in this document.

Numerous visiting Rotarians were present and twelve district clubs made cash donations totalling \$90.00 to the new club. The Charter was signed by Roy D. Hickman (President, Rotary International), Harry A. Stewart (General Secretary, Rotary International), and George W. Allsop (Governor, Rotary District 282).

Thus the club became a fully-constituted member of the world-wide organisation. The following information relates to some of the activities in which the club involved itself over the ensuing five-year period.

COMMUNITY SERVICE:

In 1974 the club took part in a door-knock appeal for the Kew Cottages. This was an official club effort in which many members participated. Assistance has been given by members to similar appeals, namely the Salvation Army Red Shield Appeal, the Freedom from Hunger Campaign and Austcare.

In recognition of the club's financial assistance in 1975 to the Connor Foundation, Rotarian Doug Thompson was appointed a Life Governor of that organisation.

The Annual Fete at the Frankston Drive-In Theatre was a major fund-raising activity for the club from 1975 to 1977 inclusive. More importantly, it provided an opportunity for many charitable bodies to raise funds from their own stalls.

The years 1975, 1976 and 1977 saw a blood pressure survey conducted from a caravan in Balmoral Park and at the Karingal Shopping Centre. This service proved to be a success and many compliments were paid to the club by participants. The club is deeply indebted to the many non-Rotarians and to wives of members who assisted with the survey.

In 1976 the club was given the opportunity of conducting a theatre premiere night at the official opening of the Village Twin Cinemas in Nepean Highway, Frankston. This major fund-raising event enabled the club to make a donation of \$5000 to a building appeal for the Mount Eliza Geriatric Centre.

After the theatre premiere night, the club organised a Time Capsule project in relation to the new theatre complex. A time capsule was built into the wall and the public was invited to lodge, for a fee, letters, tapes and other documents addressed to family and friends. The capsule will be opened in the year 2000 and the club has commissioned the members at that time to deliver these letters. The proceeds of the project amounted to approximately \$1000.

The club is deeply indebted to Charter President Lloyd Worland, the theatre manager, for his co-operation in these major projects.

Numerous other Community Service activities were undertaken. These included financial assistance to the Woorinyan Centre; an outing for the children at the Centre to Peninsula Gardens, Rosebud, and a donation of \$750.00 towards the provision of a cabin at a Langwarrin building project.

In 1976, \$400.00 was given to the City of Frankston to help purchase a house for a needy family. A major effort for the year 1977/78 was the construction of a children's playground at the corner of Lindrum Road and Karingal Drive, Karingal. Financial assistance was given to various organisations including the Mount Eliza Geriatric Centre, Mornington Special School, the Angel of Mercy helicopter, the Peninsula Women's Refuge, the Frankston Community Hospital and for the provision of a talking book for the blind.

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE:

During the period under review, the club made contact, through Rotarian Chris Dev, with the Rotary Club of Madras West, India, a contact that has been maintained over the years.

The Club has provided regular financial assistance to the Christian Welfare Association which conducts a clinic in Madras.

The Madras West club also provided the Frankston North club banners as a Community Service Project of its own.

The club became involved in the New Zealand Exchange Student Programme 1974/75 and many students passed through the club during the five-year period. In 1976/77 a student from the United States of America was hosted by the club in conjunction with the Rotary Club of Ferntree Gully.

From time to time, contact was made with other clubs overseas through visits by members, letters and by toasting clubs at our regular meetings.

Dinner meetings were held from time to time when members entertained guests who were not born in Australia. Similarly, barbecues were held where foreign-born residents were guests of the club.

In 1977, clothing collected by members was sent to Nuwara Eliya,
Sri Lanka.

A strong association with the Greek community in Frankston
was developed and will, it is hoped, continue in the future.

VOCATIONAL SERVICE:

This avenue of service was given serious consideration by the club and it was found that there was an excellent supply of speakers from within the club. These members gave talks on their own vocations and contributed extremely entertaining programmes.

The inclusion in club programmes of segments such as "What's new in my business" proved to be of great interest to members.

Members participated in Work Experience Programmes sponsored by schools in the area. The Rotary district library provided several films which provoked spirited discussion and the Four Way Test was critically examined and discussed on several occasions.

ROTARY FOUNDATION:

From the outset, the club took an interest in the Foundation and in the first year managed to achieve a 100% plateau with its contributions. At the end of five years, a plateau of 1000% was reached and the highlight of the club's activity in this area was the awarding of Paul Harris Fellowships to Past President Lloyd Beard in 1976 and Charter President Lloyd Worland in 1977.

FELLOWSHIP:

The club has endeavoured to encourage the wives of members to take an interest in the club and to be actively engaged in its undertakings. Regular ladies nights have been held to encourage this idea.

Enthusiastic directors organised visits of club members and their wives to appropriate restaurants in the city and suburbs and these have been well attended and successful.

Fellowship with other Rotarians was encouraged and large numbers of members and wives have attended District Conferences, Changeover Nights and the like. Each year during the Christmas-New Year period, combined dinner meetings have been held with the Frankston and Seaford Clubs.

CLUB HISTORY

1 July 1978 to 30 June 1980

The first Club history was prepared by Neville Foyster and covered the years 1973 to 1978. In the two years since then the Club's own distinctive character has become more firmly established. By general agreement the number of members has remained much the same - in the high thirties. This ensures an intimacy and depth of fellowship which larger clubs may not enjoy. It seems clear from the experience of other clubs that large membership does not ensure high achievement. Nor does a modest membership by any means inevitably produce modest results.

Not that Frankston North's achievements have been spectacular or even notably innovative. Sound perhaps: and rewarding enough to give hope that through increased experience and more effective application of effort much may be expected in the years to come.

Community Service

The Blood Pressure Survey was held again in 1979 and 1980 and will undoubtedly be worth continuing indefinitely unless circumstances change. Such change may not be far off if recent suggestions of State-wide annual tests throughout the community are given effect. In the meantime it remains a project which is popular both with the public and the members. A surprisingly high proportion of the patients tested are found to have high blood pressure which they were unaware of.

Fund raising either by the Community Service Committee or by a special fund raising committee (depending on the organisation for the year) has been by means of the Annual Fete, Jumble Sales and Charity Theatre Nights.

Help was given for the Woorinyan Centre's 25th Annual Fete and the Club was pleased to receive a Silver Jubilee Certificate from Woorinyan for services rendered over the years.

An elderly citizens night was held shortly before Christmas in 1979 and again in 1980. It enabled members to bring as guests to dinner with the Club elderly people in the neighbourhood who normally do not go out much or at all. A children's Christmas Party was also held each year to entertain deprived children. Both have proved to be popular and seem likely to continue as annual events.

A disappointment was an unsuccessful attempt to

form an Interact Club in 1979. It seems clear that enthusiastic and active support from schools is essential if there is to be any hope of attracting children even to an initial interest meeting.

Club Service

Attendance and membership are subjects which seem to cause more concern to club presidents than almost any other. Assumption of office brings on an instant sensitivity to these aspects of the Club's well-being and the view from the president's chair appears always to show an alarming number of empty seats. The Club's position on the District Governor's monthly attendance list is anxiously checked by the president and unless we are in the top ten or high nineties disaster awaits us.

Despite these fears membership has remained steady at between 35-40. Most of the members lost to the Club have had to resign for compelling reasons : only occasionally can it be seen that a resignation is through lack of interest. Attendance figures in a small club can be badly affected, as ours were in 1979, by two or three members being on leave of absence and by failure to send in make-up cards. During 1978 and 1979 our attendances have generally been between 70% - 80% with occasional surges into the 90's.

Good fellowship continues, particularly between the members. Games nights were successfully introduced in 1979 and theatre nights, dining out, winery tours and cricket matches have also been well attended.

Vocational Service

One of the Club's most successful new projects was a Careers Night held at the Karingal Uniting Church in 1979. Designed to help children at the local schools in deciding upon a career it was capably handled by the Vocational Service Committee and attracted an encouraging number of students. There can be few, if any, organisations better fitted to conduct such an event than a Rotary Club with membership covering a wide variety of occupations and members being able to give a first hand account of practical experience in their respective fields. Representatives from organisations such as Lysaghts, the Army, the Police, the Peninsula Ambulance Service and Monash University also took part and added to the number of careers presented.

Encouraged by this success a Careers Night was held again in 1980 in Karingal High School where more

space was available. However despite a lot of hard work and even more coverage of careers than the previous year only a few students came. It seems that holding the event earlier in the year may have been the reason for the poor response: perhaps children are not concerned about careers until departure from school is imminent. Whatever the reason, Careers Nights are to continue : a slightly different approach, better timing and close co-operation with the local schools could produce distinctly better results.

Of less importance but nevertheless instructive have been visits by the Club to local industries and organisations such as the Keith Turnbull Research Institute, South Eastern Purification Plant, Seppelts and Trotting race meetings.

International Service

The Club has continued to take part in the New Zealand Exchange Student Scheme and to be visited by Group Study Exchange Teams - from England in 1979 and from the United States in 1980.

A major fund raising activity introduced during this period was an International Dinner Dance - a dinner dance with the added attraction of displays of national dances by various groups. The Rotaractors helped and so did the local Greek community which has a special relationship with the Club.
